Spanish is the main, usually the sole official language of twenty-one countries,} and it is set fair to overtake English by the year 2000 in numbers 2 of native speakers. This vast geographical and political diversity ensures that Spanish is a good deal less unified than French, German or even English, the latter more or less internationally standardized according to either American or British norms. Until the 1960s, the criteria of internationally correct Spanish were dictated by the Real Academia Espanola, but the prestige of this institution has now sunk so low that its most solemn decrees are hardly taken seriously - witness the fate of the spelling reforms listed in the *Nuevas normas de prosodia y ortograjia*, which were supposed to come into force in all Spanish-speaking countries in 1959 and, nearly forty years later, are still selectively ignored by publishers and literate persons everywhere. The fact is that in Spanish 'correctness' is nowadays decided, as it is in all living languages, by the consensus of native speakers; but consensus about linguistic usage is obviously difficult to achieve between more than twenty independent, widely scattered and sometimes mutually hostile countries. Peninsular Spanish is itself in flux.

James Laughlin has been called the American Catullus. Like that most Greek of ancient Latin poets, he elevated his everyday subjects with wit and clarity of language. Love and hate, death and aging, politics, literature, travel, the horrors of war-- Laughlin's muse spoke of all these things with a fresh directness that make his poems both timeless and contemporary. Argentinean philosopher, theologian, and historian Enrique Dussel understands the present international order as divided into the "culture of the center" -- by which he means the ruling elite of Europe, North America, and Russia -- and "the peoples of the periphery" -- by which he means the populations of Latin America, Africa, and part of Asia, and the oppressed classes (including women and children) throughout the world. In 'Philosophy of Liberation,' he presents a profound analysis of the alienation of peripheral peoples resulting from the imperialism of the center for more than five centuries. Dussel's aim is to demonstrate that the center's historic cultural, military, and economic domination of poor countries is 'philosophically' founded on North Atlantic ontology. By expressing supposedly universal knowledge, European philosophies, argues Dussel, have served to equate the cultural standards, modes of behavior, and rationalistic orientation of the West with human nature and to condemn the unique characteristics of peripheral peoples as "nonbeing, nothing, chaos, irrationality." Hence, Western philosophies have historically legitimated and hidden the domination that oppressed cultures have suffered at the hands of the center. Dussel probes multinational corporations, the

communications media, and the armies of the center with their counterparts among the Third World elite. The creation of a just world order in the future, according to Dussel, hinges on the liberation of the periphery, based on a philosophy that is able to "think the world" from the perspective of the poor and to reclaim the Third World's distinct cultural inheritance, which is imbedded in the popular cultures of the poor. Apart from the liberation of the periphery, there will be no future: "the center will feed itself on the sameness it has ingrained within itself. The death of the child, of the poor, will be its own death." This is a disquieting but stimulating book for scholars and advanced students of philosophy, ethics, liberation theology, and global politics.

mutevole come la Patagonia, che si presenta come un deserto: «nessun suono tranne quello del vento, che sibilava fra i cespugli spinosi e l'erba morta, nessun altro segno di vita all'infuori di un falco e di uno scarafaggio immobile su una pietra bianca». All'interno di questa natura, che ha l'astrattezza e l'irrealtà di ciò che è troppo reale, da sempre disabituata all'uomo, Chatwin incontrerà un arcipelago di vite e di casi molto più sorprendente di quel che ogni esotismo permetta di pensare. Questa terra eccentrica per eccellenza è un perfetto ricettacolo per l'allucinazione, la solitudine e l'esilio. Qui i coloni gallesi versano il tè fra i ninoli; qui circolano folli, che si trasmettono il titolo di re degli Araucani o coltivano la memoria di Luigi II di Baviera; qui si incontrano ancora elusivi ricordi di Butch Cassidy e Sundance Kid; qui si respira l'aria dei grandi naufragi; qui esuli boeri, lituani, scozzesi, russi, tedeschi vaneggiano sulle loro patrie perdute; qui Darwin incontrò aborigeni dal linguaggio sottile, e li trovò così «abietti» da dubitare che appartenessero alla sua stessa specie; qui si contemplanò unicorni dipinti nelle caverne; qui sopravvive qualcuno che vuol far dimenticare un atroce passato. Come un nuovo W.H. Hudson, devoto solo al «dio dei viandanti», Chatwin ci racconta le sue molte tappe: fra baracche di lamiera, assurdi chalets, finti castelli, vaste fattorie. E ogni tappa è una miniatura di romanzo. Alla fine, la Patagonia sarà per noi pullulante di fantasmi, che si muovono sul fondo della «calma primitiva» del deserto, nella quale Hudson credeva di riconoscere «forse la stessa cosa della Pace di Dio». Pubblicato nel 1977 come opera prima, questo libro appartiene alla specie, oggi rarissima, dei libri che provocano una sorta di innamoramento. La Patagonia di Chatwin diventa, per chiunque si appassioni a questo libro, un

luogo che mancava alla propria geografia personale e di cui avvertiva segretamente il bisogno.
