Beginning in the 1890s, reaching its first full realization by modernist writers in the 1920s, and brought to its heyday during the Canadian Renaissance starting in the 1960s, the short story has become Canada's flagship genre. It continues to attract the country's most accomplished and innovative writers today, among them Margaret Atwood, Mavis Gallant, Alice Munro, Carol Shields, and many others. Yet in contrast to the stature and popularity of the genre and the writers who partake in it, surprisingly little literary criticism and theory has been devoted to the Canadian short story. This collection redresses that imbalance by providing the first collection of critical interpretations of a range of thirty well-known and often-anthologized Canadian short stories from the genre's beginnings through the twentieth century. A historical survey of the genre introduces the volume and a timeline comparing the genre's development in Canada, the US, and Great Britain via representative examples completes it. First, I will give a brief overview of the historical development as well as the political measures that were taken on Canada's way from a bilingual to a multicultural nation. Secondly, I will analyze two of Atwood's Short Stories, namely "The man from Mars" and "Dancing Girls" which were both published in the Short Story Collection "Dancing Girls and Other Stories" from 1982. I chose these particular Short Stories because they were written at earlier stages of the development of Multiculturalism, and also because they show two very different approaches on how to deal with intercultural contact on a day-to-day basis. During the second part of this term paper, I will give an analysis of the plot and the characters, and grasp the way Atwood portrays Multiculturalism in both Short Stories, respectively. Finally, I will summarize my findings and give a brief recapitulation.

This book provides much more of a cultural and political context for the early development of this literature. It emphasizes the "self-determining" viewpoints and activities of diverse people as they produce materials for the young. *Multicultural and Ethnic Children's Literature...* describes organizations, events, activities, and other contributions of diverse writers, illustrators, publishers, researchers, scholars, librarians, educators, and parents. It also describes trends in the research on the literature. It elaborates more on ways in which diversity is still an issue in publishing companies and an extended list of related industries. It describes related literature from outside of the U.S. and makes connections to traditional global literature. Last, *Multicultural and Ethnic Children's Literature*, shows the impact of multiculturalism on education, libraries, and the mainstream culture, in general. While the other books on multiculturalism focus on how to find, evaluate, and use multicultural materials, especially in schools and libraries, this book is concerned over whether and how books are produced in the first place and how this material impact the broader society. In many ways, it supplements other books on multicultural children's literature.

Her teacher, Ms. Lopez steps in to end this attack on Marisol and her cousin Rosa and gives Marisol a proper farewell party for her return to Puerto Rico. *The Magic Paintbrush* - A very poor painter seeks help from his art school friends who live in Mexico City. He cannot get the help he needs from his former friends, but on his way home he finds a magic paintbrush and is miraculously saved from poverty. *The Honey Hunt* - In this story Gideon and Peter have learned to capture honeycombs in the forest in Kenya, East Africa. They have learned how to outwit the bees who lead them to their hives and the honey. On this trip, Peter gets hurt and they are forced to spend the night in the forest before they can return home.
