One of the great achievements of the story's structure, is that Cyril is both emblematic of everything that is ridiculous about his upper crust milieu, and also entirely free of any of its twitty residue. Even when recovering from a boozy night, Cyril is unfailingly fresh as a daisy. He belongs, with Jack Worthing, to that family of literary heroes who are never made dull by the decadence of the world they inhabit.
