La genial autora norteamericana dejó al final de su corta vida varios ensayos sin publicar y una serie de artículos diseminados en varias revistas. Estos textos, seleccionados y editados por sus amigos de toda la vida Sally y Robert Fitzgerald bajo el título *Misterio y maneras*, se caracterizan por el estilo directo y

simple de su autora, su inusual ingenio y perspicacia, y su profunda fe. Sin duda alguna, es un libro especial que el paso de los años -la primera edición es de 1969-, lejos de hacerlo extraño, confirma su actualidad. Esta colección ya clásica de ensayos, editados por primera vez en español, es un referente obligado para lectores, escritores y amantes de la literatura contemporánea.

Misterio y maneras University of Chicago Press Azul... (1888) is a book of stories and poems by Rubén Darío. Written while the poet was living in Chile, Azul... has been recognized as a pioneering work of Hispanic Modernism that launched the career of a leading Latin American poet. Both experimental and traditional, Azul... blends Darío's concern over the sustainability

of modern life with his abiding interest in the myths and magic of ancient cultures. Infused with classical symbolism, inspired by the myth and philosophy of Ancient Greece, Rubén Darío's *Azul...* bridges the gap between ancient and modern. Rather than focus on the differences between the two, he envisions the past as a living entity, allowing history and fantasy to

coincide with the social realities of his time. In these poems and stories, fairies from the plays of Shakespeare appear alongside the working men and women of Latin America. *Dreams* coincide with a reality mired in poverty, labor, and passionless social climbing. Poets and port workers sing and die in a city of ghostly beauty. *Azul...* is less a book than it is an experience, and nearly a century and a

half after its publication it remains one worth the taking. With a beautifully designed cover and professionally typeset manuscript, this edition of Rubén Darío's *Azul...* is a classic of Nicaraguan literature reimagined for modern readers. *Maestros de la Prosa - Joseph Conrad*

his new collection of essays, Adam Zagajewski continues his efforts to reclaim for art not just the terms but the scanted spiritual dimension of modern human existence that they stake out. Bringing gravity and grace to his meditations on art, society, and history, Zagajewski wears his erudition lightly, with a disarming blend of modesty and humor. His topics range
